

## Claire's questions

October 2006

I am a health researcher and I started my part time PhD at Barchester University 12 months ago.

Briefly, my PhD is to what happens to people's drug and alcohol addiction when they go to prison. I am actually registered in the Sociology Department, although I do not have a Sociology background. My main supervisor was my Masters supervisor and encouraged me to undertake a PhD, hence why I registered through that department. He has no knowledge of addiction or of prisons, but is supervising me as he is a qualitative researcher (and my PhD uses qualitative research).

My first query is that he has now gone on sabbatical for 6 months and I have had no offer of an alternative supervisor whilst he has been away. He has been on the email a little, but it is not quite the same as being able to meet to discuss ideas. What do you think that I should do about this? My other supervisor has more knowledge around prisons, but not around addiction.

My other concern is that my PhD covers a number of disciplines such as health, criminology, psychology, rather than being solely Sociology. (Although I am trying to explore what makes people change or not change their drug/alcohol use behaviours when in prison). Do you think that it is a problem that I am registered through the Sociology Department? How much will I need to use Sociology and sociological theory in the final thesis? Importantly, does being registered with the Sociology Department mean that I will be examined by sociologists?

I just thought that I would fill you in on the situation since you gave me the advice. I met with my Department today and sorted out a number of issues.
